

**PETTY SESSIONS.**

**LONG STRATTON.**—On Tuesday, *Jonas Stevenson*, labourer, Carleton Rode, was brought up in custody, before *W. Gwyn, Esq.*, charged with setting fire to certain farm buildings in that parish, in the occupation of *Mr. W. Hilling*, on the previous Thursday. *Mr. Linay* (from the office of *Mr. Sadd*, of Norwich) defended the prisoner. —*John Long*, a labourer, deposed—*I met the prisoner just after the fire broke out coming in the direction from it. He had one shoe on, and the other in his coat pocket. I went to the fire, and shortly afterwards the prisoner came there. Cross-examined: I did not speak to the prisoner when I met him. I have known him about five years. I first told Mr. Glover that I met the prisoner. I have been convicted of felony.—George Glover, dealer: I saw the prisoner on the night of the fire. Long, the previous witness, was at the fire first. I said to the prisoner, "How was it you were not here as soon as me?" to which he replied, "Why, I was in bed."—David Bateman: I went to the fire, and on my way there saw the prisoner, who halted as if he had something the matter with his shoes or feet, but he came to the fire about five minutes after I got there.—This being the case for the prosecution, Mr. Linay submitted that it was one of mere suspicion; that no jury would convict of the serious crime of arson upon such evidence; and that, therefore, it would be a great hardship upon the prisoner to send him to take his trial.—The bench, however, decided upon sending him to the assizes, but*
